# MS Lesions Can Disrupt the Urinary System

The commercial with the clever jingle, "Got to go, got to go, got to go, got to go, go, go" can make us chuckle, but for people with MS who have urinary system problems, it is no laughing matter.

Function of the urinary system requires messages to travel through the central nervous system. Those messages, however can be disrupted by

MS lesions. When the systems function normally, the urine collects slowly in the bladder until it expands to hold 4-8 ounces of urine.

MS lesions disrupt the flow of neurological messages back and forth, between the urinary system, spinal cord and brain, causing malfunctions of the urinary system.

"Failure to store" urine is caused when over active bladder muscles contract, even when there is

only a small amount of urine in the bladder, causing the urge to urinate frequently.

With "failure to empty," the message through the spinal cord to empty the bladder is disrupted. The sphincter does not relax, so the bladder does not empty completely. The bladder continues to fill and expand, causing an enlarged, overly relaxed bladder, referred to as "flaccid" bladder, resulting in hesitancy in urination. Both conditions can cause urgency to urinate, dribbling, and incontinence.

A third condition, "combined dysfunction" in which the bladder and sphincter muscles contract at the same time, causes a combination of "failure to store" and "failure to empty," leading to urgency, dribbling, hesitancy and incontinence.

The concern about urinary problems is the risk of urinary tract infection (UTI), which usually occur when the bladder does not completely empty, allowing bacteria to breed and mineral deposits to form stones, which irritate the bladder. A UTI can cause urgency, frequency, burning, pain in the abdomen and/ or back, fever, muscle spasms, and dark, foul smelling urine. However, at times infections can occur without noticeable symptoms.

A UTI can cause MS symptoms to worsen, referred to as a "pseudo exacerbation." When the infection is gone, function generally returns to what it was before the infection. Beware! Without treatment, a UTI can be life threatening.
